Subject: Position and Grant Requests – JFO #2929 - #2931

Enclosed please find three (3) items, which the Joint Fiscal Office has received, two from the Administration and one from the Judiciary.

JFO #2929 – \$1,001,577 from the Federal Emergency Management Agency to the VT Dept. of Public Safety. The funds will be used to provide public assistance to Chittenden, Grand Isle, Lamoille, Orange and Orleans counties, which were impacted by severe storms and flooding that occurred on May 4-5, 2018. Approximately \$1.34 million in damages were estimated and the FEMA funding would cover 75% of the costs. The remainder of funding would come from state and local sources. The state source of funding would be the Emergency Relief and Assistance Fund and the Department has estimated that \$142,150 would be funded from this source over three state fiscal years, \$85,290 of which would be spent in the current fiscal year.

JFO #2930 – \$2,041,347 from the U.S. Dept. of Health and Human Services (HHS) to the Vermont Judiciary. The funds would be used to expand the Windsor DUI court docket to include Windham and Orange Counties. The funding would also be used to increase capacity in the existing Windsor County docket area. Funding for this program was previously provided through the Governor's Highway Safety Program but now the funding will be coming from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMSHA) at HHS. One (1) limited-service position was authorized under the previous grant and the Judiciary has requested that the position be re-authorized under the new grant. The position is titled Treatment Court Coordinator and is tasked with coordinating and implementing the day-to-day activities of the treatment court docket.

JFO #2931 – \$143,455 from the U.S. Dept. of Homeland Security to the Vermont Dept. of Public Safety. The funds have been granted as part of the Nonprofit Security Grant Program for the purpose of integrating the preparedness activities of nonprofit organizations that are at a high risk of terrorist attacks with broader state and local preparedness efforts. The entities that are slated to receive these funds are: Castleton University, Copley Health Systems, Essex Alliance Church and Springfield Area Parent Child Center. The state would serve as a pass-through entity for the funding, which would go out to the nonprofits in state FY2019.

Under the provisions of Section 401 of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, 42 U.S.C. §§ 5121-5207 (Stafford Act), and implemented by 44 CFR § 206.36, I request you declare a Major Disaster for the State of Vermont for Public Assistance in Chittenden, Grand Isle, Lamoille, Orange, and Orleans Counties and Hazard Mitigation statewide as a result of a Severe Storm and Flooding which impacted communities across northern Vermont during the afternoon of May 4, 2018, and into the early morning hours of May 5, 2018.

This was such a potent storm system that it prompted National Weather Service (NWS) tornado watches for all of Vermont except the two southernmost counties from 3:27pm to 10:00pm on May 4, 2018. Severe thunderstorms moved through Vermont from west to east between 6pm and 10pm with scattered wind gusts in excess of 70 mph as well as hail and localized flash flooding. Immediately following the severe thunderstorms and continuing into the overnight hours was a period of strong gradient winds with widespread wind gusts in the 35 to 45 mph range with localized wind gusts exceeding 50 mph. The wind produced damage in the form of downed limbs, trees on utility lines and isolated structural damage due to fallen trees and resulted in an estimated 50,000 customers without power at nightfall on May 4, 2018.

Very brief “training” of thunderstorms brought intense rainfall which came down at a rate of nearly one inch in 10 minutes and two inches in one hour. The storms moved from Chittenden County east across Lamoille, Washington, Orleans, Caledonia and Essex Counties, causing localized flash flooding and washed out roads. Municipalities across the western part of the State saw widespread damage in the form of downed trees and power lines and road and culvert washouts. The worst damages were in Chittenden County, where the towns of Bolton, Hinesburg, Richmond and Williston reported roadway damage. The Town of Shelburne (2010 Census population 7,144) reported extensive tree damage throughout the town from straight-line wind gusts, with the highway, wastewater, police, fire and rescue crews all working to remove debris. A transfer switch on a sewer pump station in Shelburne failed, and the Town noted multiple headstones were damaged at the municipal cemetery.

Lake Champlain’s lake level rose above its flood stage of 100 feet during the May 4-5, 2018 incident. The combination of persistent strong west winds of 30 to 45 mph and gusts in excess of 50 mph at times during the evening and overnight hours led to continuous battering waves along Vermont’s shoreline, including the Colchester Causeway, a regionally important bicycle/pedestrian corridor that suffered significant erosion damage and currently remains closed to the public as the vitally important summer tourism season begins. A 2010 study by the Vermont Transportation Research Center at the University of Vermont calculated overall tourism spending associated with the Causeway was in the range of \$1 million to \$2.5 million per summer as of 2008. The southern portion of the Causeway is in Colchester, in Chittenden County, and the northern portion is in South Hero, in Grand Isle County.

In Franklin County in northwestern Vermont, the combination of high winds, heavily saturated soils, and high lake level caused a mass slope failure to begin along the banks of the Missisquoi River in Highgate on state-owned property which was acquired by the State and has been maintained as a culturally important native cemetery, containing human remains dating back three millennia. While damages for this site have not been validated for Public Assistance, the site will need to be stabilized and this was another significant impact of the May 4-5, 2018 storm.

Elsewhere in the State, Hyde Park in Lamoille County and Newbury in Orange County reported significant damages. The Town of Worcester in Washington County reported a utility pole snapped causing an oil spill which necessitated a State Hazmat response. The Newport City Fire Department in Orleans County sustained damage to the roof of their building. Throughout the State, several dozen towns had crews out through the weekend of May 5-6, 2018, clearing debris and removing downed trees.

Bolton, Vermont is a small mountain town in eastern Chittenden County with a 2010 census population of 1,182 people and per capita income of \$24,256 per person. Flood damage to roads and culverts in Bolton from this storm were \$323,042, in excess of \$273 per capita.

The storm caused millions of dollars of damage to the electric grid. Green Mountain Power (GMP), Vermont's largest electric utility, estimated their system recovery cost from the storm at \$2.5 million. Although GMP is a private utility, and therefore, not eligible for federal Public Assistance, they restored power to more than 50,000 customers during and after the storm (out of a total service area of approximately 265,000 customers), underscoring the financial impact of this event on Vermonters will be significant.

The National Weather Service provided timely and relevant warnings and information before, during, and after the May 4, 2018 incident. The meteorological factors and precursors for this incident are described in Enclosure E ("For The Record" Weather Summary Memorandum for the 4 May 2018 Severe Thunderstorms and Wind Event) by Scott Whittier, Warning Coordination Meteorologist for the National Weather Service based in Burlington, Vermont. Additional analysis and detail regarding the meteorological event has been posted by the National Weather Service on their website: <https://www.weather.gov/btv/Summary-of-the-Severe-High-Wind-and-Hydro-Event-on-May-4-2018>.

Vermont utilities had begun preparing in advance of the May 4, 2018 storm. For example, the utilities held Emergency Prep Conference Calls on May 3 and May 4, 2018, and GMP received mutual aid crews from out of state and Canada.

The State Emergency Operations Plan (SEOP) was implemented during this event. The May 4-5, 2018 storm was fast-moving, and the State Emergency Operations Center (SEOC) at the "Monitoring" activation level coordinated support to the local level utilizing additional Watch and Public Information staff. In addition to Vermont Emergency Management (VEM), state government units and supporting agencies active during the incident and its immediate aftermath included: Vermont 211; Vermont State Police; Agency of Transportation; Department of Buildings and General Services; Department of Environmental Conservation; Department of Fish and Wildlife; and Department of Forests, Parks, and Recreation.

By the conclusion of the incident, 46 communities had reported impacts to public infrastructure including temporary road closures. All impacted communities followed their Local Emergency Operations Plans (LEOPs) and reported public and private property damages through their Regional Planning Commissions (RPCs) to VEM.

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Fortunately, there were no deaths or major injuries reported. The American Red Cross stood at the ready, but no emergency shelters were opened.

On May 10, 2018, after collecting damage reports from local communities via Vermont's RPCs and the Vermont Agency of Transportation, and from public utilities through direct outreach, Vermont's Director of Emergency Management, Erica Bornemann, wrote to FEMA Region 1 Acting Administrator Paul Ford requesting a Preliminary Damage Assessment (PDA) for Chittenden, Grand Isle, Lamoille, Orange, Orleans, and Washington Counties. PDA teams comprised of local, state, and federal representatives conducted site visits and desktop reviews of utility work on May 17 and 18, 2018.

On May 11, 2018, VEM received reports of damages which had taken place at an important state-owned archeological site in Franklin County during the May 4-5, 2018 storm. After review by State of Vermont subject matter experts, Director Bornemann wrote to Acting Administrator Ford on May 29, 2018, to request that Franklin County be added to the PDA. On May 31, 2018, due to the ongoing review of the Franklin County damage site, I requested an extension for the declaration request timeline until June 22, 2018, which was granted.

Final validated PDA totals were provided by FEMA to my staff on June 19, 2018. The Joint Preliminary Damage Assessment validated \$1,292,275 in public infrastructure damages in the five counties which exceeded threshold. That total does not include \$50,652 in Franklin County and it does not include \$53,070 in Washington County. It also does not include damages in some small towns which incurred eligible costs but were not visited during PDAs because their counties had already exceeded thresholds. The validated PDA results as of this writing do not include any damages for the Monument Road archaeological site in Highgate (Franklin County). Regardless of eligibility determination, damages at that site will exceed \$150,000 and will need to be addressed.

Of the validated total as of June 19, 2018, Category A (Debris) was \$38,937 (3.0%); Category C (Roads and Bridges) was \$489,998 (37.9%); Category F (Utilities) was \$325,190 (25.2%), and Category G (Parks, Recreational, and Other) was \$429,945 (33.3%). None of the damaged infrastructure counted in the PDA has commercially available insurance coverage, and therefore, all repair costs must be covered by taxpayers and utility ratepayers.

Each county included in this declaration request had damages which exceeded the per capita threshold of \$3.68.

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The impacts of the May 4-5, 2018 event exceed the currently available capabilities of the State of Vermont. Since 2013, Vermont has experienced eight federally-declared and numerous non-declared disasters. DR 4120 (May 2013 flooding), DR 4140 (June-July 2013 flooding), DR 4163 (December 2013 ice storm), DR 4178 (April 2014 flooding), DR 4207 (December 2014 severe winter storm), DR 4232 (June 9, 2015 flooding), DR 4330 (June-July 2017 flooding), and DR 4356 (October 2017 storm and flooding) all stressed the State's capacity to respond and recover. This series of disasters, in addition to the ongoing recovery efforts associated with DR 4022 (Tropical Storm Irene of August 28, 2011), continues to stress and deplete state and local recovery resources.

Vermont has experienced several events over the past two years which have had significant impacts to the State but were not federal-declared disasters. In February 2016, the SEOC was activated due to flooding on the Passumpsic, Missisquoi, Lamoille, and Winooski Rivers which resulted in numerous road and private property impacts in Caledonia, Franklin, Lamoille, and Washington Counties which were absorbed by the state and local communities. In early May 2017, a severe windstorm caused over 16,000 power outages and large amount of debris across the City of Rutland. In January 2018, ice jams flooded homes on the Missisquoi River in Swanton and the Lamoille River in Johnson.

Vermont's Town Highway Emergency Fund and Emergency Relief and Assistance Fund (ERAF) had been budgeted for the new State Fiscal Year which begins on July 1, 2018, based on projected obligations from previous disasters. The May 4-5, 2018 event places additional demands on both State disaster funds.

The impacts from this disaster could have been worse had it not been for effective hazard mitigation work previously undertaken. For example, the Town of Charleston in Orleans County reported: "...no significant damage. Our mitigation efforts and general upgrade of surface material and practices are making a difference! A few years ago, Charleston would have been a mess." As another example, Vermont Electric Cooperative used Section 406 hazard mitigation funding from DR 4207, the ice storm of December 2014, to bury power lines at Gillette Pond in Richmond, a heavily wooded site which had seen repetitive power outage damages. For the second consecutive wind disaster, there was no utility line damage at Gillette Pond from the May 4-5, 2018 event.

The greatest remaining unmet recovery need is for financial assistance to the impacted public utilities and communities to help them avoid economic shock to businesses and families. Without federal assistance, small public utility customers would face rate spikes, as would local property taxpayers in some communities. The total statewide sum of all infrastructure impacts from this event exceeds \$4 million based on local damage

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estimates and utility company reports. For a State of only 626,000 people, that is roughly \$6 of damage per capita. The impacts of this storm on the State of Vermont were of sufficient magnitude to support federal assistance under the Stafford Act.

Thank you for your continued support of the State of Vermont and our citizens during a time of acute need.

Thunderstorms and Wind Event

A potent storm system moved across Vermont during the evening and overnight hours of May 4-5th. Severe thunderstorms moved through Vermont between 6 pm and 10 pm on May 4th, bringing scattered wind gusts in excess of 70 mph as well as localized flash flooding. Immediately following the severe thunderstorms and continuing into the overnight hours was a period of strong gradient winds with widespread wind gusts in the 35 to 45 mph range with localized wind gusts exceeding 50 mph.

The combined wind events produced wind damage in the form of downed limbs, trees on utility lines and some isolated structural damage due to fallen trees and resulted in an estimated 50,000 customers without power.

Very brief training of thunderstorms with intense rainfall (nearly one inch in 10 minutes and two inches in one hour at an NWS employee home in Nashville/Jericho) from Chittenden county east across Lamoille, Washington, Orleans, Caledonia and Essex counties lead to localized flash flooding, including several washed out roads in Jericho and Bolton and a landslide along Route 5A along Lake Willoughby.

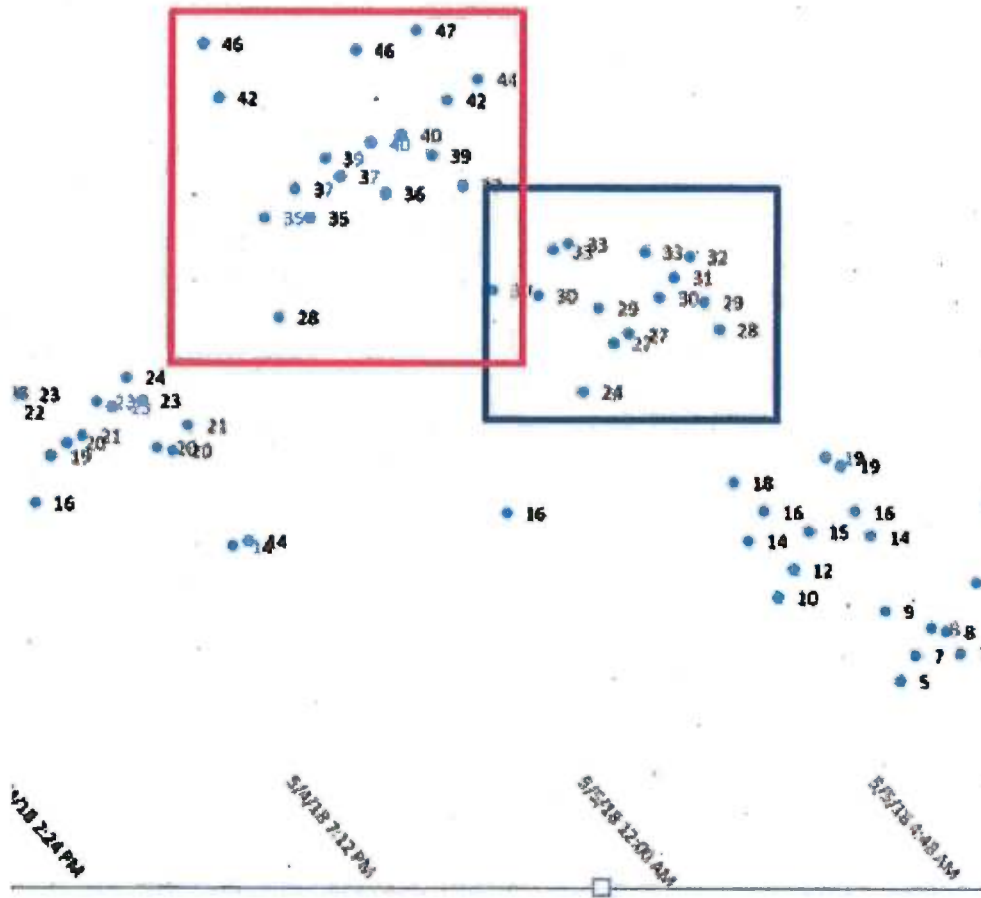
In addition, the Lake Champlain lake level was at its flood stage of 100 feet during this incident. The combination of persistent strong west winds of 30 to 45 mph and gusts in excess of 50 mph at times during the evening and overnight hours lead to continuous battering waves along Vermont's shoreline, including the Colchester causeway that witnessed significant damage.

Attached to this memo are the Colchester Reef Peak observed winds, hourly radar images, local storm reports and measured wind gusts for Vermont.

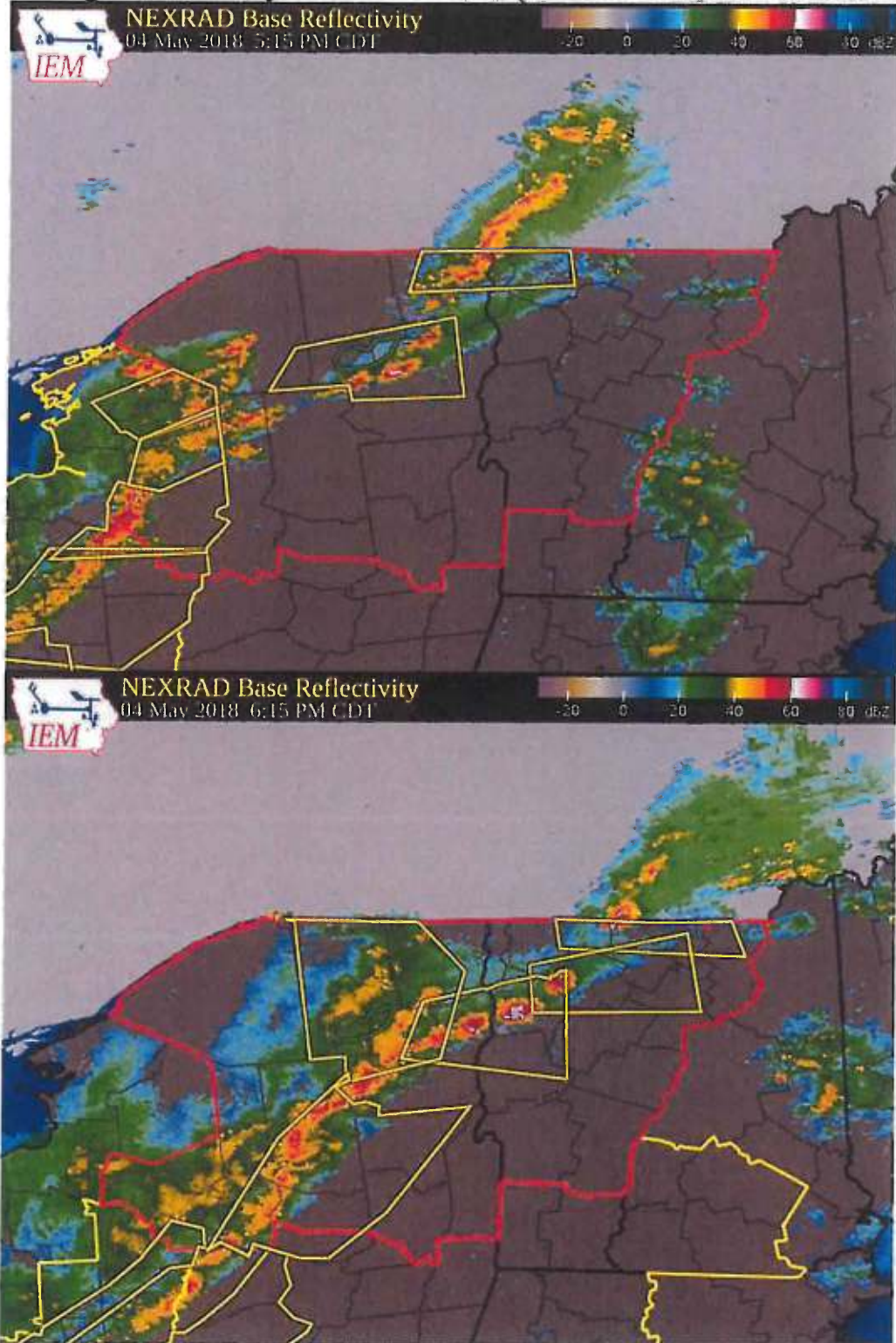
Colchester Reef Peak Gusts

6-10 pm LST (7-11 pm EDT): 35-47 knots (40-54mph)

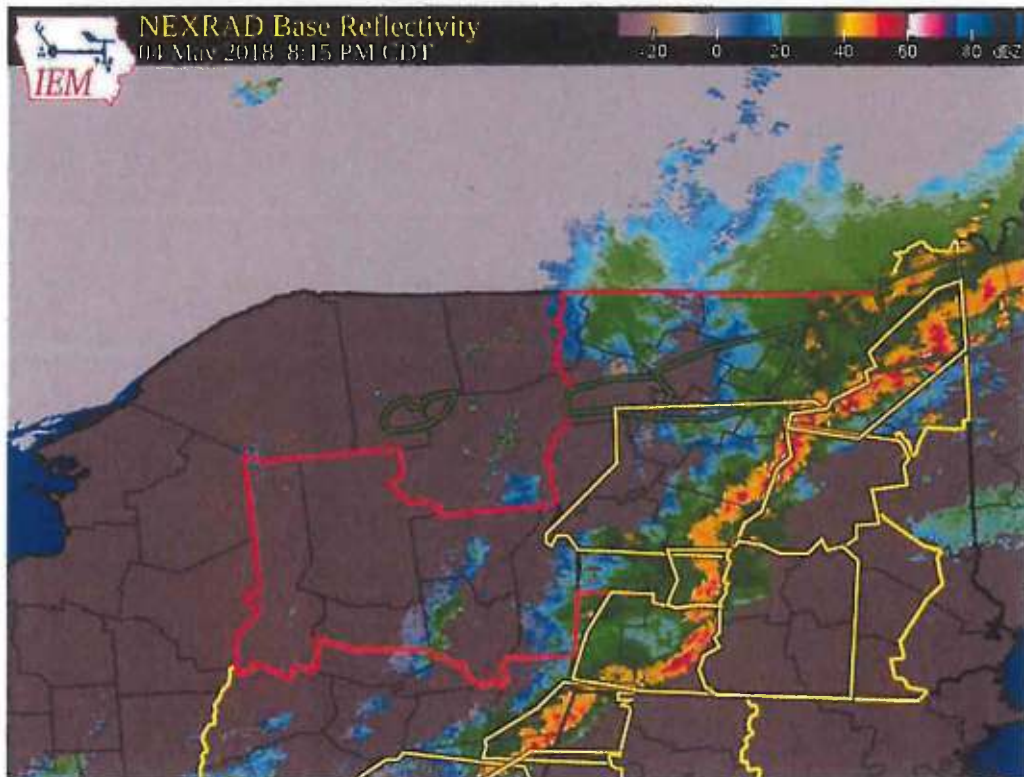
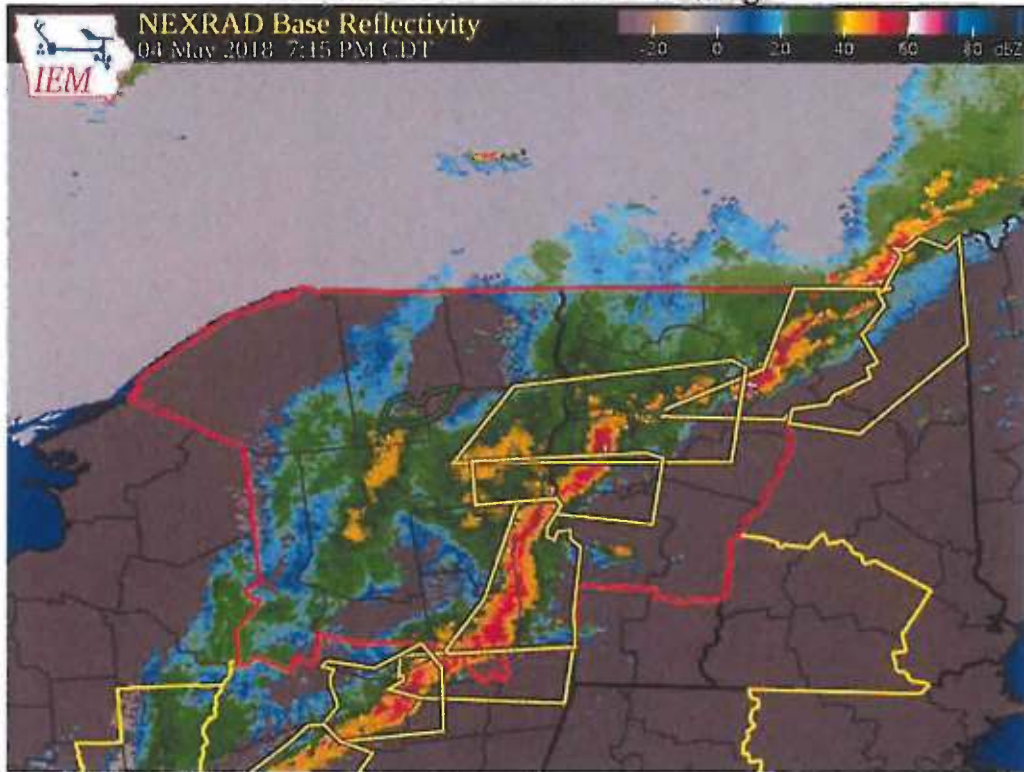
10pm- 2am LST (11 pm-3am EDT): 25-35 knots (30-40 mph)

The State of Vermont was hit by a potent storm system during the evening of May 4, and into the early morning hours of May 5, 2018. Tornado warnings were issued, and although no tornadoes were observed, wind gusts were recorded in excess of 70 mph in some locations. There was localized flash flooding and erosive road damage. Lake Champlain crested above flood stage, and there was significant damage to the Colchester Causeway, an economically significant regional recreation corridor between Chittenden and Grand Isle Counties. Over 50,000 customers lost power during the storms, and restoration efforts continued until May 8, 2018. Damages validated during joint Preliminary Damage Assessments exceeded the statewide threshold, even when only counting damages within counties which exceeded thresholds.

9. Description of the nature and amount of State and local or Indian tribal government resources which have been or will be committed. Include additional details in enclosed Governor's or Tribal Chief Executive's cover letter.

This storm moved through quickly, and the Emergency Operations Center was never fully activated. Impacted communities and public utility companies followed their emergency operations plans and took immediate actions to restore emergency access and power. Communities reported damages to Vermont Emergency Management via their Regional Planning Commissions, pursuant to the State Emergency Operation Plan (SEOP). Emergency Relief and Assistance Fund (ERAF) is provided from the State general fund to assist municipalities with a percentage of non-federal cost share (ranging from 30% to 70% of non-federal share, depending on communities' status with respect to five criteria articulated in Vermont's ERAF Rule). Communities are responsible to raise their portions of non-federal share through local property taxes. Vermont's Town Highway Emergency Relief Fund provides some funding to communities in non-qualifying counties. Public utilities do not receive any ERAF and rely on ratepayers to cover their cost share.




